#### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Dunphy called the Regular Monthly Council Meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance.

#### 2. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

It was moved by Councillor Diane Griffin and seconded by Councillor Steve Ogden that the agenda be approved as presented. Motion Carried.

# 4. **BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES**

Councillor Ogden stated that he had asked at a previous meeting that the monthly financial statements be put in a format a layperson can understand, and he reiterated that request.

#### 5. PRESENTATIONS FROM THE FLOOR

At this time Commanding Officer Rob Alain, who was accompanied by Chief Petty Officer Chris Watt – Coxswain at HMCS Queen Charlotte, addressed Council.

Good afternoon, and once again thank you for the tremendous support from the Town of Stratford during our Battle of the Atlantic Parade. What a fantastic location to host such an important remembrance, and the post-parade reception was beyond our highest expectation.

At this time Commanding Officer Rob Alain presented Mayor Dunphy with a framed photo of the parade which Mayor Dunphy graciously accepted. Mayor Dunphy stated that we all appreciate your service, and the Town of Stratford was certainly happy to be part of the event.

#### PRESENTATIONS OF WATERSCHOOL AWARDS

Mayor Dunphy addressed Councillors, Staff, Parents, and Students.

On behalf of Town Council, it is a great honour to welcome the students and their families here today. The Town of Stratford places great importance on our environment, and is very concerned with maintaining the quality of our water, the health of our streams, forests, wetlands, and wildlife.

Your artwork sends a clear and beautiful message that your water and environment are important to you. This award isn't just about sharing what you have learned with everyone you know, but being a leader of change in the way you live and in your way of thinking. It is a lifetime commitment of striving to change for the good of our environment. The results of this commitment will be far-reaching, and will be passed on to future generations.

So congratulations students, we are very proud of you. As a way to honour you here today, we have for you a framed piece of your artwork. Each piece of art will represent a month in next year's school calendar. The calendars will be given out to every child at Stratford Elementary and Glen Stewart schools, and to the participating classes at Grace Baptist, Prince Street, and Vernon River schools before the end of this school year.

#### 8. MAYOR'S REPORT

Following is a list of meetings and events attended by the Mayor since the last Council meeting:

  excellent conversation with the business owners. Thank you to Wendy for organizing
  the visits. Also presented some welcome kits and plaques to new Stratford
  businesses.
- Attended the Dandelion Festival and gave the opening remarks.

- Along with Wendy Watts and CAO Robert Hughes, attended a round-table discussion
  with local businesses. They were updated on the upcoming bylaw review, sign bylaw
  changes, and the wastewater treatment plant.
- Attended the Junior Achievement of PEI Business Hall of Fame dinner where Stratford residents Blair MacLauchlan and Elwood Lawton were inducted into the PEI Business Hall of Fame. Entrepreneurship is alive and well in Stratford!
- Met with Noel Keelan, who is the Chairperson of Monaghan County, Ireland. He was on PEI as part of the Fort Augustus Irish Descendants Delegation.
- Attended the FCM Annual Conference in Winnipeg. Excellent workshops, study tours, and plenaries. Along with Councillors Griffin and MacDonald, visited six skateparks in Winnipeg, and spoke with staff and skateboarders who provided some valuable information.

Councillor Ogden gave an overview of his report noting that the speed bumps will be left in various locations for a month at a time, with the exception of Marion Drive where the two that are there will remain until the school year is over.

# b) Street Light Report

Councillor Ogden noted that the committee discussed the addition of street lights and recommended that five additional lights be added to the Georgetown Road. This is to cover the section of sidewalk that will be added in the near future.

There was also some discussion about installing an additional light on Sunnyside Drive. It was noted that one home owner doesn't want it and a second home owner is alright with it - as long as it doesn't affect his tree line. The committee discussed the situation and agreed that if the light was installed across the road on the corner, it should not disrupt residents in any way.

#### 11. INFRASTRUCTURE

#### a) Report

Deputy Mayor Cooper noted that things are going well. He stated that we had better luck this year with the odour at the waste water treatment plant. He noted that there was a media release put out to let residents know what work is being done on the plant, and he commended the staff for all their hard work.

A letter was sent to all residents of the Rankin area, to let them know that the Rankin water project is going ahead this spring.

It was noted that the grass cutting contract was awarded to a new company this year, C&W Landscape, and the contract started on May 17, 2016.

Deputy Mayor Cooper noted that a student, Fredrico Watson, from the Energy System Engineering and Technology Program at Holland College, worked with the Town for his on-the-job-training by doing an energy audit of the Crossroads Community Centre. Fredrico made a presentation to the committee on his findings.

#### **b)** Resolution INC06-2016 CWWF 2016

Moved by Deputy Mayor Cooper Seconded by Councillor Diane Griffin **WHEREAS** the projects and budget estimates outlined in the following table have been selected for the period 2016 through 2018 under the Clean Water Wastewater Fund (CWWF).

AND WHEREAS the Town of Stratford is applying to the CWWF program in the amount of \$27,991,300 to complete the above water projects in the period 2016 through 2018. Please note that the two options for the replacement of the lagoon system are both included in the application due to the short window of opportunity to file applications and after consultation with the provincial government. Further consultation with the residents will occur prior to the final option being selected.

**BE IT RESOLVED** that these projects are designated as priorities one (1) through (5) as outlined in the above table of the CWWF projects applied for under the most recent call for applications closing June 17, 2016. In addition, Council understands and commits that it will be responsible for its' designated share of the eligible costs of the project, and will assume responsibility for any and all operating and maintenance costs resulting from the project.

Discussion: It was noted that we will either have our own treatment plant which would

be fully enclosed, or we will ship to Charlottetown.

To date, soccer registrations have reached 400+ participants for 2016 and the premier teams began play the last week of May.

Current GO PEI Program "Continue to Run (5K) Group" meets every Monday at the Town Centre. In partnership with GO PEI, we are offering two 'senior chair yoga programs' at the Mutch Drive Seniors Complex.

Intro to Sports for youth between the ages of 3 - 5 years will be offered again this summer. This program will be offered each Wednesday evening from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at Glen Stewart School, and will start the first week in July.

Preparations for the Canada Day celebrations are coming along nicely. A wide host of activities will again be presented throughout the afternoon. It was noted that we have confirmation of funding (\$3500) from the National Canada Day Committee.

The  $10^{th}$  Dandelion Festival was held on Monday May 23 from 10:00 a.m. -3:00 p.m. and more than 500 people attended this great event.

The Stratford Farmers Market will be held at Cotton Park, and will open for the season on Saturday, June 25. It will run each Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. until Saturday, September 24, 2016.

# c) <u>Resolution PH005-2016 – DP006-16-Sobey's Inc. – Commercial Use Intensification –</u> 9 Kinlock Road

Moved by Councillor Diane Griffin Seconded by Councillor Steve Ogden

**WHEREAS** an application has been received from Sobeys Inc. to renovate and expand the existing Sobeys store on parcel number 859637, located at 9 Kinlock Road within the Town Centre Commercial Zone (TCC); and

**WHEREAS** the expansion will include the addition of 11,083 sq. ft. of floor area as well as a complete redesign of the exterior and interior of the building; and

**WHEREAS** Sobeys is located within the Town Centre Core Area (TCCA) it must be designed in accordance with the Design and Development Standards for the TCC Zone. All aspects of the conceptual design plans submitted have been reviewed and meet the

design standards for the TCC Zone and are consistent with the Core Area Plan as well as Official Plan policies; and

**WHEREAS** the applicant was required to include minor site landscaping elements under the Bylaw, but agreed to treat the expansion as if the parking lot was being developed as new, which resulted in additional landscaping and buffering.

**BE IT RESOLVED** that preliminary approval be granted to application DP006-16, which proposes to renovate and expand the existing Sobeys store on parcel number 859637, located at 9 Kinlock Road within the Town Centre Commercial Zone (TCC), subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Conformance with the conceptual drawings as attached to the application submitted to the Town;
- 2. That a Building shall be designed in accordance with the 2010 National Building Code, and;
- 3. All other relevant provisions of the Town of Stratford Zoning and Subdivision Control (Development) Bylaw are satisfied prior to the issuance of the Development Permit.

Discussion: This resolution bears the recommendation of the Planning, Development and Heritage Committee.

With the aid of the overhead projector Patrick displayed the site plan and explained the request. He noted that it is consistent for the commercial area and it met or exceeded the standards.

Councillor Ogden stated that he appreciates the fact that Sobey's is expanding in the Town.

Patrick did note that our parking requirements are severely exaggerated and he hopes as we go through the bylaw, we are able to come up with some kind of a compromise. The new parking lot will be a major concern regarding the storm water management.

Councillor Griffin noted that what we can do is ask Council for a variance to the bylaw. This is something that can be worked out, but we don't want to hold up development.

Deputy Mayor Cooper stated that he would like to see it approved with the existing parking and reviewed only if needed.

# d) <u>Resolution PH006-2016 – VA001-16-Andrew and Kelli Inc – Front Yard Variance</u> Request – 8 MacNeill Crescent

Moved by Councillor Diane Griffin Seconded by Deputy Mayor Cooper

**WHEREAS** an application has been received from Andrew and Kelli Ing for a front yard variance to parcel number 603688, located at 8 MacNeill Crescent in order to construct one Single Family Dwelling on an existing lot within the Single Family Large Residential Zone; and

**WHEREAS** the applicants are proposing to construct based on the Passive Home Design approach and by moving the dwelling closer to the front it allows for better southern exposure and prevents the need for the possible removal of established trees on rear of the lot; and

**WHEREAS** the front yard variance request is for twenty feet (20 feet), or 40% closer to the front property boundary than the bylaw permits, which is 50 feet for a single family dwelling located within the Single Family Residential Large Zone (R1-L). The applicant, therefore, is seeking a variance to the front yard setback from 50 feet to 30 feet; and

**WHEREAS** notification letters were sent to property owners who own parcel(s) of land which are located (or part) within sixty meters (200 feet) from any lot line of the parcel being proposed for variance. Three inquires had been received regarding the variance asking for clarification on the proposal but all had no objection; and

**WHEREAS** this application is consistent with the vision for the Town, Sustainability Plan and the Official Plan.

**BE IT RESOLVED** that approval be granted to the application received from Andrew and Kelli Ing requesting a front yard variance of 20 feet, (or 40%) to the minimum front yard setback requirement of 50 feet for a single family dwelling located within the Single Family Residential Large Zone (R1-L), on parcel number 603688, located at 8 MacNeill Crescent for the construction of a Single Family Dwelling.

Discussion: It was noted that this resolution bears the recommendation of the Planning, Development and Heritage Committee.

Patrick reiterated that the planning department received three responses and there were no significant concerns.

# e) Resolution PH007-2016 - RZ001-16-7711557 Canada Inc. - Rezoning Request - R2 to R3 - 29 Stratford Road

Moved by Councillor Diane Griffin Seconded by Councillor Steve Ogden

**WHEREAS** an application has been received from 7711557 Canada Inc. to rezone a portion of parcel number 328021 (0.54 acres) from the Two-Family Residential Zone (R2) to the Multiple Family Residential Zone (R3). The remnant portion of this parcel of land (0.26 acres) is currently zoned Multiple Family Residential Zone (R3); and

**WHEREAS** the proposed rezoning is to allow for the development of a 20 unit, 3 story multi-unit building with underground parking; and

**WHEREAS** the current Bylaw requirement within an R3 zone would allow for 17.2 units on this 0.8 acre property but the applicant is proposing a 20 unit building. This would require a variance of 2.8 units (or 16.3%) to the current R3 zone allowance; and

**WHERES** the developer has engaged the services of a traffic engineer to study the proposed development and the conclusion stating that the traffic impact resulting from the proposed apartment building will be negligible, and the project may proceed as planned without risking exceeding the capacity of the road; and

**WHEREAS** with regard to the Official Plan, this application is in consistency with relevant policies in the Plan.

**BE IT RESOLVED** in accordance with Section 24 of the Town of Stratford Zoning and Subdivision Control (Development) Bylaw, that Council call a public meeting to solicit input from residents on the application from 7711557 Canada Inc. to rezone a portion of parcel number 328021 (0.54 acres) from the Two-Family Residential Zone (R2) to the Multiple Family Residential Zone (R3) on July 27, 2016 at 7:00 pm.

Discussion: It was noted that this resolution is just for a public meeting and was

approved by the Planning, Development and Heritage Committee.
