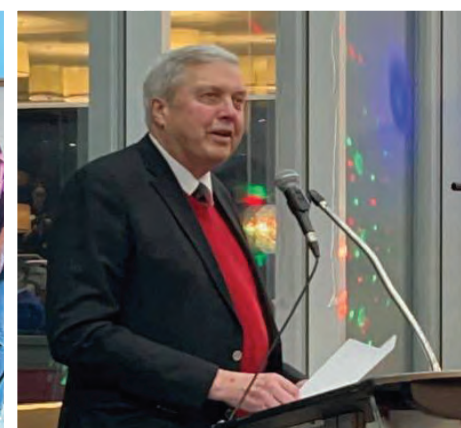

## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Welcome to warmer temperatures and longer, sunnier days after an eventful winter for our town. By the time you read this, Canada will have elected a new government, and Stratford will have a new Member of Parliament (MP). We hope the new federal government will finalize funding for the much-needed Wellness Centre at our Community Campus. Additionally, we anticipate the completion of plans for a new Junior High School in the near future, which Stratford urgently requires to meet the needs of our growing population, and are excited about the progress on the construction of the high school.

As we enter this new season, your Council and I remain hopeful and optimistic about progress on several key priorities:

- **Wellness Centre** – The Province of PEI has pledged full support and funding for our Wellness Centre and while we have worked very hard to also secure the necessary federal funding we have not yet received a response. We will continue working with our new MP to ensure Stratford receives an acceptable level of federal funding. Local fundraising is underway, led by a generous \$500,000 donation from the Provincial Credit Union for a new Youth Centre that provides vital programming for our young residents.
- **Housing** – The new Official Plan and Zoning and Development Bylaw will be finalized this fall. Many new housing units have been added, and we are on track to meet our targets while ensuring Stratford remains affordable, sustainable, and attractive to families and businesses.
- **Infrastructure** – We have applied for federal and provincial funding for sewer and water infrastructure to support housing growth and are ready to begin work as soon as funding is approved.
- **Climate Change Preparedness** – Backup power is being installed at major pumping stations to ensure they remain operational during outages, strengthening our resilience to extreme weather, and protecting essential services and the environment.
- **Business Park Expansion** – Interest in our new Stratford Business Park lots has been continuing, which will lead to more jobs and economic growth. This expansion highlights Stratford's appeal for business, investment, and innovation.

This year, we celebrate Stratford's 30th anniversary! What began as five small rural communities has grown into a thriving town with a rich culture and an exceptional quality of life. Over three decades, Stratford's progress has been remarkable, yet our strong sense of community remains unchanged.

Since incorporation, Stratford's population has more than doubled, yet we have maintained our small-town charm. Our residents are dedicated volunteers, show mutual respect at public meetings, and embrace collaboration. This community spirit makes Stratford a wonderful place to live, work, and raise a family.

Looking ahead, Stratford's journey will continue with growth, opportunity, and success. Together, we will keep building a town that is beautiful, welcoming, and vibrant for future generations. With the support of our residents, we will achieve even greater things—imagine that!

## INFRASTRUCTURE DEPARTMENT



Under the Town of Stratford's Dangerous and Unsightly Premises Bylaw (#22), property owners are required to upkeep and maintain their property year-round whether they live on the property or rent it out. This includes, but is not limited to, keeping the grass cut (not exceeding 8 inches in height) and ensuring waste is not left unattended on the property.

## UTILITY

### > Subdivisions

In Stratford, developers are required to install sewer and water systems during development. Stratford Utility takes over the systems only after they are tested and approved. This summer, extensions are proposed on McCarron Way, Foxwood Flourish, and Kelly Heights while several other developments are in the concept phase.

### > Completing 2024 Projects

Reinstatement work will be completed on the Corish sewer force main upgrade along MacKinnon Drive, including repaving of the active transportation path and driveway access to the sewer lift station on Stratford Road, by the Esso car wash. Contractors will also complete water, sewer, and electrical work within the Community Campus.

### > 2025 Projects

The Utility is following through its plan for backup power at sewer lift stations. Work was tendered recently for the addition of five sewer lift station backup generators.

On the municipal water side of operations, Stratford Utility will install additional hydrants along Shakespeare Drive and Williams Gate for increased firefighting protection. A section of watermain at the Trans-Canada Highway and Jubilee Drive intersection will be repaired this year as well.

### > Sump Pump Rebate Program

The Town of Stratford initiated the sump pump rebate program in 2024, which will continue through 2025 until funds are depleted. Residents who currently direct their sump pump water into the Town's sanitary sewer system may be eligible for up to a \$2000 rebate to redirect their sump pump and install a battery backup system for their sump pump. ### PLEASE NOTE:

Sump pumps cannot be connected to the municipal sewer system as stated in the Town's Water and Sewer Customer Service Regulations Bylaw. It is illegal to discharge any storm water, surface water, roof run-off, surface drainage, subsurface drainage, foundation drainage, or water used for heating or cooling into the Town's sewer system.

### PLEASE NOTE:

The Town of Stratford water system is operated and maintained to Provincial standards and water is tested by staff on a regular and required basis.

## PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

### > Maintenance

Staff are busy with property and building maintenance, installing and relocating temporary speed humps, maintaining trails and other daily duties.

### > Active Transportation

This summer contractors will replace the existing sidewalk on Glen Stewart Drive, in front of the two schools, with a new wider paved multi-purpose path. This will then complete the dedicated active transportation path from Stratford Road to Kinlock Road, along Glen Stewart Drive and MacKinnon Drive.

The Town has applied for shared funding for several other locations, but at this point, have no definite project approved yet.

The Town has partnered again with Trans Canada Trail, who have provided funding to continue trail maintenance along the Trans-Canada trail. We thank them for their continued support of our Active Transportation Maintenance and Development Plan.

### > Glen Stewart Drive & Stratford Road Intersection

The Province of PEI has made the Town aware of plans to make improvements at this intersection this year. They are currently in the project design phase and hope to have more information soon on timelines and proposed intersection changes.

### > Speed Signs/Speed Humps

Staff have been busy installing temporary speed humps throughout Stratford. In our ongoing effort to reduce speeding in Stratford, the Town continues to purchase speed radar signs and speed humps and install them in temporary

locations where issues are known to exist. The Town has a process for requesting a temporary speed hump, which requires a written request to be filled out by the person requesting the speed hump, and some guidelines to be met for final approval. ### > Town Streets, Ditch Infilling, and Culverts

All roads, streets and ditches in Stratford are owned and maintained by the Province of PEI. Provincial crews are already cleaning up from winter plow, salt, and storm water damage. They are also busy patching potholes and installing or replacing culverts. **Please note that any request to infill your ditch or replace a raised culvert must be directed to the Provincial Department of Transportation at 902-368-4770.**

## Not in your pipes!

Municipal sanitary sewer system pumps are not equipped to remove the following products from the wastewater.

### Remember NEVER flush:

- Hazardous products used in home maintenance (such as paint, cleaning products), gardening products (fertilizers), or automobile care products.
- Fats, cooking oils, essential oils, polishing oils or motor grease
- Personal hygiene products (such as cotton buds/pads, disposable towels and others)
- Pharmaceuticals of any kind (pills or liquid)
- Woven fabric (such as disinfecting wipes, baby wipes, or any so-called "flushable" wipes)

These can cause major problems for pipelines and cause sewer backups in your home (resulting in an expense to the homeowner).



## PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT AND HERITAGE

### > The Building Bylaw and National Building Code

Last year, the Town of Stratford amended the Building Bylaw, Bylaw #50, to include the adoption of the 2020 National Building Code (NBCC) and the 2020 National Energy Code of Canada for Buildings. The Building Bylaw is enforced through scheduled inspections during construction at various stages of completion. These inspections will verify work against the approved submitted plans and against the NBCC.

Any new application for a single detached development requires the following information:

- Development Application Form
- Utility Application Form
- Entrance Way Application Form
- Completed Deck Pamphlet (if using Helical Piles, an engineer stamped helical pile design is required)
- Building Plans, including floor plans, elevations, and cross-section
- Truss Package, including layout and engineer-stamped truss shop drawings
- Site Grading Plan prepared by a certified surveyor
- Letter of Authorization (if applying on behalf of the landowner)
- Any required engineering for steel beams or columns, or tall walls

**Please note that preliminary plans will NOT be accepted**

The Planning Department would like to remind residents of the following for the upcoming building season to best prepare for their summer projects:

- All deck construction in Stratford requires a deck permit. This includes new construction, replacement of existing decks, as well as major repair work. For clarification, please contact the Building Official.
- Helical Piles (also known as screw piles, screw anchors, or helical piers) may be used to support decks with submission of the engineer-stamped design prior to approval as per Building Code requirements.
- Any decks supporting a hot tub must have an engineer-stamped design for approval.

*To ensure that your permit is ready in time for your project start date, please submit your complete application as early as possible to allow staff time to process it. Missing documents may cause delays in processing your permit.*

### > Mobile Vendors Bylaw

**(formerly Street Vendors Bylaw)**

The Town has engaged MRSB Group to undertake the development of a new Bylaw to permit small street vendor businesses to operate in the Town. Street vendors are typically prepared food-oriented businesses and often located in parking areas. During October, MRSB hosted an online survey and held a public open house with the results of the survey showing that there is a lot of support and interest in seeing these new businesses in the Town. The bylaw is expected to be approved by mid-2025.

### > Development Permits

From January to March 2025, the Planning Department has issued a total of 15 development permits. The following table shows a summary of development activities between January and March 2025.

## PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT AND HERITAGE



### > Housing Accelerator Fund

On March 14th, 2024, The Honorable Lawrence MacAulay, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food, officially announced that the Town has entered into an agreement with the Federal Government, to provide the Town with a funding contribution of \$4.9 Million to make systematic changes to the current development regulations to remove barriers and promote new housing growth to meet the increase in population.

The following is an update on the initiatives and planning projects that were developed as part of the agreement:

#### Official Plan Review Update

The Town has engaged Upland Planning + Design Studio to undertake the review and the amendment of the Town's Official Plan and Zoning and Development Bylaw. Upland began working on the initial visioning of the project in September, then between September and December, engaged with stakeholders, elected officials and hosted an online survey.

This winter, Upland Planning held five public open house engagements on 5 focused topics: Housing, Transportation and Recreation, Culture and Heritage, Employment Lands and Development, and Environment and Agriculture. A copy of all the reports is available at [shape.townofstratford.ca](http://shape.townofstratford.ca), along with the What We Heard Report from the Phase 1 Visioning engagements. The Town is looking forward to receiving a 1st Draft of the new Official Plan and Zoning and Development Bylaw from Upland towards the end of Summer 2025.

#### Short-Term Rental Accommodation Bylaw

The Town has engaged ATN Strategies to undertake the development of a Short-Term Rental (STR) Accommodation Bylaw to regulate this activity in our community. Examples of STRs include online tourist accommodation platforms such as Airbnb, Vrbo, and Booking.com. As part of this important process, the Town co-hosted

a public open house on November 20th, along with an online survey to obtain community input to ensure that the bylaw reflects the diverse perspectives and needs of our community.

Community input from residents, families, businesses and STR hosts will play an important role in shaping a bylaw that balances the interests of all involved.

#### Permit-Ready Housing Plans

The Town has engaged Formed Alliance Architectural Studio (FAAS) to establish the Town's first housing catalogue set of permit-ready housing options. The catalogue will be a collection of "Missing Middle" housing types that will be made available to purchase from the Town's planning department. These plans will be something completely new and different to the Town, which we hope will provide a step up for small developers and landowners looking to help with the housing needs. As we move towards addressing the housing needs of the Town, creating a catalogue of missing middle housing types will help speed up the process and reduce design fees for those looking to build. The plans will be designed to be more cost efficient in relation to constructions cost and with non-profit organizations in mind.

The housing plans are expected to take up to 6-8 months to complete with the first set of plans intended to be available for the summer of 2025.

#### Online E-Permit System

As part of the Housing Accelerator Fund Initiatives, one of the Towns' goals was to provide an online e-permit system. The implementation of an e-permit system will aid in streamlining applications and processing times. Town Planning staff are currently in the early stages of learning the system and process with rollout of the e-permit system planned for summer 2025.

#### Planning Fees for Affordable Housing Developments

One of the major elements of the Federal Government for the Housing Accelerator Fund was to provide easier access to affordable housing for non-profit organizations. The Town took the initiative to help alleviate some of the barriers for non-profit organizations with Town Council passing a resolution to remove development fees for NGO's, non-profit and Provincial entities providing affordable and supportive rental housing. Organizations must present a business plan in which they state that the rent for these units does not exceed 30 percent of gross annual household income for low-income households.

### > Stratford Gymnasium Track Direction and Rules

Lanes at the track are for walking and running. Directions for walking/running change daily – these are posted every day by the entrance to the track. We ask that users do not walk more than two people wide in the walking lane so that faster walkers may pass in the outside lane (running lane) when traffic allows. Indoor footwear is required.

***Young children MUST be directly supervised by an adult if using the gymnasium track. The fitness area (equipment only) is restricted to those 15 years and older.***

## 2025 TOWN OF STRATFORD SENIOR, ADULT AND YOUTH VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD

### AWARD OBJECTIVES

Volunteers are - and always will be - an essential part of our community. This award is an annual award, which acknowledges and rewards a volunteer citizen who has made an outstanding contribution to our community.

The recipient will receive prizes (to be determined by Town Council) and the recipient will have his or her picture displayed at Stratford Town Center. The winner's name will also be engraved on a special trophy to honor each year's Volunteer of the Year.

ALL NOMINEES will be recognized for their volunteer efforts and will receive an official acknowledgement on behalf of the Town of Stratford.

### ELIGIBILITY

Volunteering is the act of people being involved in the improvement of their surroundings. Volunteer acts can occur within a structured organization (ex. volunteering at your library) or in an informal setting (ex. raking leaves for your elderly neighbor).

Those eligible to receive this award include any individual who performs volunteer act/acts (as defined above) within the Town of Stratford community. The purpose of this award is to focus on recognizing individual citizens; however the judging committee will also accept a submission that nominates two or more people together.

### SELECTION PROCESS

The Town of Stratford will oversee the award, provide title, and the way in which it is presented. A committee under the direction of the Town's Recreation Committee will select the winner.

### > Water Conservation

### > Forest Management Plan



The Town of Stratford is beginning to implement the recommendations of our Forest Management Plan, with the goal of enhancing biodiversity, improving climate resilience, and strengthening green spaces across our community.

Over the coming months, we'll be planting native trees and shrubs in key areas throughout Town-owned properties. These efforts support healthy ecosystems and provide long-term benefits for both people and wildlife.

### > Community Gardens

The Town's community gardens are officially open for the season! These shared spaces support local food security, environmental stewardship, and community connection.

The Town of Stratford maintains a dedicated garden plot again this year, with all produce grown in this space being donated to community members in need. It's one more way we're working together to build a healthy, sustainable, and supportive community.

### History of the Town of Stratford

In early times, the Stratford area was a Mi'kmaq summer camping location. By the 1750s, Acadian families settled in the area and started economic activities, such as farming, shipbuilding, and brick making, followed by settlers of Scottish and English descent. The fertile land continued to attract small farmers and by the 1800s, small communities began to emerge. These communities formed the backbone of what would eventually become the modern town.

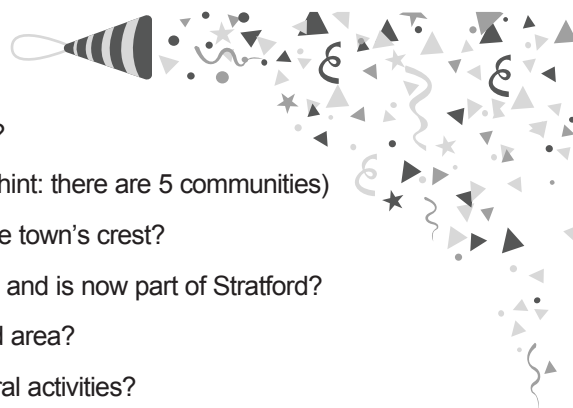
Back then, the area was connected to Charlottetown by ferry, and later by the Hillsborough Bridge, which greatly influenced development, enabling Stratford to become a residential suburb for people working in Charlottetown.

Stratford officially became a town in 1995, through the amalgamation of the former communities of Bunbury, Southport, Cross Roads, Keppoch-Kinlock and the unincorporated area of Battery Point. Since then, the town has grown rapidly. Today, Stratford is known for its welcoming neighbourhoods, active community life, and commitment to sustainable development.

## STRATFORD'S 30TH ANNIVERSARY



Until at least 1865, Mason Road was the sole entry into the community of Bunbury, entering from Cross Roads to the south. By 1880, a beach road connected the west end of Bunbury Road to Southport. Mason Road was named after the Mason family, which began with William Mason, who emigrated from England.

### > Legacy Book Project

As part of the Town of Stratford's 30th anniversary celebrations in 2025, the Stratford Legacy Book Project was developed as a meaningful and creative way to mark this milestone and honour the many residents who have helped shape our community.

Led by the Town's Diversity and Inclusion Sub-Committee and partially funded by the PEI Seniors' Secretariat, this intergenerational initiative was designed to bring together 15 long-time residents of our community and 15 youth residents in grades 5 through 12 to engage in conversations and preserve personal stories that reflect the heart and spirit of Stratford.

Following a public call for nominations, community members were invited to take part in the project. Local youth interviewed adult residents, capturing their memories, reflections, and experi-

ences of life in Stratford. The resulting written stories, each no more than 1,000 words, were curated and compiled into a special commemorative book. This anniversary book serves as both a tribute to the past and a gift to the future: a way for upcoming generations to connect with the people and stories that have shaped the town they call home.

The book was officially launched in May 2025 at a community event celebrating the Town's 30th anniversary. Copies are now available at Town of Stratford offices.

## GARDENING TIPS FROM THE TOWN'S HORTICULTURIST

### IT'S TIME TO GET YOUR RAIN BARREL BACK OUT FOR THE SUMMER SEASON!

Rain barrels are a great investment when it comes to capturing and recycling water.

Place one beneath your downspout – 1000 sq ft of roof surface can collect 420 gallons of water in inch of rainfall!



### Gardening Tips

By now, we hope that you are “**plan**” **ting** your vegetable garden and perennial flower beds. With the increasing cost of food, it is even more important now to grow your own food. In doing so, you get to decide how to grow it and what to use as an organic way of dealing with pests and diseases.

The Town of Stratford held a gardening workshop this past winter and it was a pleasure to meet some fellow gardeners. It was four nights of fun, hands-on learning. This was a beneficial way to get started on growing plants (such as peppers and celery) that need to be planted early to reach maturity before the last frost for the season (typically around June 10th on PEI). If you do decide to start plants early next year, consider investing in a set of grow lights to help your plants grow strong and sturdy. You may even find them on sale this time of year!

Planning and planting your garden take time but use this time to really get to know your space and enjoy the feeling of being out in nature. When purchasing seeds, you may want to consider heirloom or open-pollinated ones. This means you can grow the plants, then save the seeds from them once they reach maturity, and plant

again the following year to achieve the same type of plant. This makes your garden more sustainable and reduces costs.

Whether you have a large or small space for growing, you will be amazed of what you can grow in that space. Some gardeners find growing in rows from north to south directions the best, as plants enjoy the full advantage of light. Others divide their gardens into square blocks where they grow a small amount of each vegetable in these spaces. This is known as square foot gardening. Growing plants that benefit one another, such as carrots with onion, tomato with basil, and cucumbers and beans, is known as companion planting. This is advantageous as it helps the plants grow healthier when next to the companion and reduces pest issues in a natural way.

If you do not like weeding, consider growing your vegetables in containers instead. Container-grown vegetables save time as they do not require weeding. They can also be convenient when grown right on your doorstep or patio deck. Certain types of plants can be grown vertically, such as beans and cucumbers, ideal for maximizing your space.

So, go ahead—start your home vegetable garden and see how much fun growing your own food can be. Take a “**leaf**” of faith!



### Dispose of Invasive Plants Properly!

Do not put invasive plants in your compost cart when disposing of them. They should always go in your waste cart. Place invasive plants in a clear plastic bag and secure the bag. Write the plant name (or “invasive plant”) on the bag before placing it in your waste cart.

Town of Stratford is a welcoming and inclusive community, and in this edition of Town Talk, we would like to recognize our **Mexican** community members and celebrate their rich culture.

Mexico is a colourful and diverse country, rich in history, traditions, and flavours. With a population of over 126 million people and more than 60 Indigenous languages still spoken today, Mexican identity is a blend of Indigenous roots, Spanish heritage, and African influences. The result is a culture that is warm, welcoming, and full of life.

Here are some highlights about Mexican customs and traditions that help paint a picture of this beautiful culture:

### > Hospitality is Everything

In Mexico, guests are treated like family. If you ever visit a Mexican home, do not be surprised if you are offered a warm meal, a drink, and lots of smiles—right away. It is all part of the culture's emphasis on generosity and connection.

### > Food is not Just Food; it is Tradition

Mexican cuisine is deeply regional and full of soul. Tacos, tamales, pozole, mole, and enchiladas are just a few dishes that have become staples in many parts of the world. Street food is also a huge part of everyday life, with vendors serving everything from "elotes" (grilled corn) to sweet churros.

### > Día de Muertos (Day of the Dead)

It is one of the most meaningful and visually striking celebrations in Mexico. Held on November 1st and 2nd, families honour their departed loved ones with altars decorated with candles, marigolds, sugar skulls, and favorite foods of the deceased.



It is a time of remembrance and celebration, not sadness—a way to keep memories alive across generations.

### > Mexico's Independence Day (September 16<sup>th</sup>)

Often mistaken for Cinco de Mayo (May 5th), the Mexican Independence Day commemorates the start of the independence movement in 1810. The night before, families and communities gather to hear the traditional "Grito de Dolores" (The Cry of Dolores)—a symbolic call for freedom, echoed across plazas nationwide.

### > Traditional Clothing Reflects Local Identity

During festivals, you may see people wearing embroidered blouses, "rebozos" (woven shawls), or "charro" suits. These outfits are often worn while performing folk dances like the "Jarabe Tapatío" (the Mexican Hat Dance) to the sounds of lively mariachi music.

### > Family is at the Heart of Everything

In Mexican culture, family ties are strong and multigenerational, with a lot of respect for elders. Family gatherings—often loud, filled with laughter, and full of food—are an essential part of life.

### > Mexico City is Full of Stories

Built on the ruins of the ancient Aztec city of Tenochtitlán, Mexico's capital is one of the oldest in the Americas. It is also one of the largest cities in the world—and interestingly, it is slowly sinking because it was built on a lakebed!

### > Mexico Cuisine is UNESCO Recognized

Mexico's food traditions are listed as Intangible Cultural Heritage by UNESCO. This recognition honours the cooking techniques, community rituals, and ancestral knowledge passed down through generations, especially in the making of dishes like mole and tamales.

### Welcoming the Warmer Months

As the Minister Responsible for the Status Women, I was pleased with the recent announcement of the bilateral agreement between the Federal and Provincial governments to support women's access to contraceptives.

This initiative empowers women and all individuals who rely on these contraceptives in PEI with the freedom and confidence to make informed choices about their health.

During the Spring Legislative Assembly, the Minister of Finance introduced the 2025-2026 operating budget for Prince Edward Island. This budget highlights the priorities that matter most to Islanders: healthcare, housing, affordability, and economic growth. There is continued investment in both early years and school aged childcare, increased funding to the George Coles Bursary, continued access to affordable transit transportation, and more. These financial investments will play a crucial role in helping our community thrive, and I'll be closely following their rollout to ensure our local needs are heard and met.

As we move into summer, I look forward to continuing our conversations and seeing many more of you at upcoming events and around the community.

### Trump, Trade & Tariffs

Trade and tariffs have dominated the year, creating uncertainty and raising questions about the future. While we stay mindful of developments to the south, we focus on what we can control.

On April 10, we tabled the 2025–26 operating budget, which includes \$42 million dollars for tariff contingency and a working capital fund. These funds aim to provide direct support—it won't make companies whole, but a meaningful step forward. We're committed to working with business and industry leaders to ensure these programs meet real needs. If you have ideas, concerns, or questions, please reach out—we can set up a meeting within a week.

### Key Highlights from the Operating Budget that Stratford residents may find of interest:

**Income Tax relief:** \$12.4M annually for businesses (corporate), \$9.5M for individuals (personal)

**Bursary increases:** George Coles and Marion L. Reid increased to \$3,500 – if you have kids heading to post-secondary, ensure you have looked through the details on both.

**Home care:** Permanent Self-Managed Care Fund and expanded At Home Caregiver Grant—\$10M+ investment. We have had several calls on these funds.

**Childcare:** Over \$10M to create or convert affordable childcare spaces, including new family home centers—a key need in Stratford. Operators interested in more information are encouraged to reach out.

### Healthcare Update

Despite workforce challenges, we're making progress. We have 41 physicians signed in 2024 (13 in family medicine); 31 already practicing, 9 begin in 2025, and 1 in 2026, and we have 8 additional physicians signed in early 2025. This results in a net gain of 21 physicians in 2024.

PEI is also leading in healthcare workforce growth. According to the 2023 CIHI report, our supply of nurse practitioners grew from 7.6 per 10,000 in 2014 to 37.5 in 2023—more than double the national rate. Most NPs work with Health PEI, strengthening access to care for Islanders.

Progress is being made. Recruitment has been significantly improved, and it goes beyond doctors and nurse practitioners but to all key components of the health system including nurses and allied health professionals. Education support and pathways continue to be expanded to bring more Island students into the health workforce.

### Looking Ahead

As we move into the warmer months, I hope you take the time to enjoy everything a PEI summer has to offer—whether it's a walk on the beach, a backyard BBQ, or cheering on our kids at a soccer or ball game. I'll also note that more than any other year, let's do what we can to support our incredible local businesses.

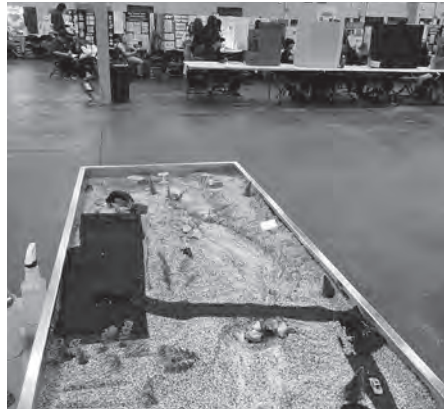

It was a busy April with Water School running throughout April at the Emergency Services Centre in Stratford.

This program began in 2011 and it is always a SAWIG highlight to help teach and run the program, so that approximately 500 grade 5 students from around Stratford and Charlottetown can learn about water conservation and watersheds.

SAWIG is proud to be part of such an impactful program that helps shape the environmentalists of tomorrow!

## > SAWIG Healthy Headwaters Project

As part of a Wildlife Conservation Fund project, SAWIG will be looking at headwaters around our watershed boundaries to implement ways in which to improve the health of such an important part of freshwater systems. This will include performing assessments, some tree/shrub planting, invasive species removal, and the removal of any blockages negatively impacting our headwaters. We are excited to get started on this project and are thankful for the support of the Wildlife Conservation Fund.

## > Saltmarsh Project



As part of our Nature Smart Climate Solutions fund project, we will continue to monitor the Keppoch Marsh (Kinlock Beach) area, which includes performing eel grass monitoring. Eel grass is such an important carbon sequestering aquatic plant, and we hope to learn more about the eel grass population in Stratford.

As the weather warms up and we wait in anticipation and excitement for all this summer will bring, now is the best time to remind ourselves all the ways to remain safe as the temperatures rise. The P.E.I. RCMP urges you to remember these 4 areas to protect yourself.

### > Summer Safety for Cyclists

As more Islanders are hitting the roads and trails on two wheels, remember to:

- Wear a helmet, always: It's smart, and is law for riders of all ages.
- Use hand signals: Always let drivers know when you are turning or stopping.
- Ride on the right: Stick to the same direction of traffic and stay as far to the right as possible.
- Be visible: Wear bright clothes, lights, and reflectors at dusk or in low visibility.

### > Summer Scams to Watch Out for: Don't Get Burned

Longer days, warmer nights, and unfortunately seasonal scams. Remain alert for these trends:

- Vacation rental scams: If that cottage deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Verify listings and don't send e-transfers to strangers.
- Fake events tickets: Only buy festival or concert tickets from trusted vendors.
- If something feels off, please trust your instinct.

### > Summer Checklist Safety Edition

P.E.I. summers are hard to beat, but to ensure maximum enjoyment, take note of this checklist.

#### At the beach:

- Swim in supervised areas
- Keep a close eye on children around water.
- Watch out for changing tides and currents.

#### Boating:

- Always wear a life jacket.
- Don't drink and drive. Yes, that includes boats.
- Make sure your vessel has the required safety gears.

#### Campfires & BBQs:

- Follow local fire bans and regulations.
- Never leave a fire unattended.
- Keep water or an extinguisher nearby, just in case.
